IN THE SPOTLIGHT: BARBARA RICHARDS PITNEY

Barbara Richards grew up in Montclair, New Jersey. As an Art History major, a highlight of her years at Finch (1956-1960) was taking the senior thesis class in her junior year, thanks to Dr. Marshall Mount. The subject of her thesis was ARCHITECTURE AFTER THE INDUS-TRIAL REVOLUTION. After college, Barbara went to work in the Art Department of Norcross Greeting Cards in Midtown Manhattan. There, Mr. Norcross took her under his wing because her having an extensive knowledge of art was not sufficient, as he had a business to run. She stayed only 2 years because she was offered the job of Finch Alumnae Association Administrator. Her husband worked for Mobil Oil and had applied for a position in the International Division. He was accepted, and in 1964, they moved to Lagos, Nigeria. As fate would have it, her be-

posted to Melbourne, Australia where Qantas Airlines taught her how to figure rates. Back in Nigeria, a Pan Am agent had taught her how to configure mileage tickets, unlike the South Pacific practice of backhauling (stopping in the same city twice) was illegal and the fare was no longer based upon mileage, which created a great financial disadvantage. After almost 4 years, and back in the U.S., she opened a travel agency, Wabba Travel, in Basking Ridge, NJ, which she still runs to this day. (Fun fact: a "Wabba" is a bronzed winged pigeon and is an aborigine word). In the 1990s, Barbara married Philip Pitney. Sadly, Philip died 3 years ago from complications of Lyme disease. Barbara has 2 daughters from her first marriage: Kirsten Sibilia, a partner in an architecture firm in NYC; and Keely Loveys, a mother, and "techie", who

loved Finch Art History professor, Dr. Mount, went to Nigeria on a grant but their years did not coincide. During her time there, Barbara helped expand the collection of the Nigerian Art museum in Lagos by offering to give appraisals and export visas for art in exchange for invaluable pieces to be donated to the Museum. In those years, American expats were smuggling art out of the country, by stashing it under fake bottoms of their luggage. If caught, they would lose everything. So, the expats ended up donating valuable pieces to the Museum Collection in exchange for permits to take other artifacts with them. Also during that time, she wrote a guidebook to Lagos, which she sold to corporations to familiarize expats and visitors with that city's remarkable history and street culture. The book was a huge success; so much so that the country's Director of Education bought 3,000 copies for distribution in their schools as they offered no local history classes! Returning to NYC a short time later, the couple was

She keeps in constant touch with Ceil Ainsworth, as well as fellow Finch classmate, Susan Embree Parker.



Lois Ziegler recalled that "Dr. Tomasini started each art history class with, 'Ladies, please remove your charm bracelets.' We all wore gold charm bracelets, and the clanging just drove him crazy! During the first class, he showed a slide



and asked the name of the art and its creator. It had bright colors, boxes, and lines, and did not look at all like any mountainous landscape or somber religious items I had seen in church. It was my eye-opening intro-duction to modern art - Broadway Boogie Woogie by Piet Mondrian, and I have never forgotten it. Since Finch was merely blocks away from the Met, we were able to walk there often. And, since I live only several blocks from the Met, I still do, to this day."

Peggy Millheiser, mentor to Finch Scholar Justine N'Gozan, reports:

Though her parents remain in the Ivory Coast, Justine and 3 of her siblings have moved to other countries, including the United States, France, and Ghana.

Justine has "always been amazed to see how scientific knowledge could be used to make informed decisions in different areas such as communications, and even meteorology." Combining her interest in finance and her love for mathematics has led her to study financial mathematics, which can give her an entree to the world of finance while, at the same time, honing her mathematical knowledge and skills.



In March 2012, Justine moved to Connecticut. In July 2014 she relocated to Texas to attend the University of Texas at Arlington and to work as a graduate teaching assistant. In the summer of 2017, Justine interned at the National Science Foundation's (NSF) Mathematical Sciences Graduate Internship (MSGI) Program at the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory in Livermore, California. Sarah Guido Sutcliffe




