



Cosgrave Honorees: Mellow Memories of Their Alma Mater

"In my days at Finch, I had a wonderful psychology teacher, **Gladys Romanoff**," said recent Cosgrave honoree **Georganne Aldrich Heller.** "She tried her best to get me to go further with my studies and become a therapist, but with Finch's proximity to Bendel's, Bonwit's, and Bergdorf's, I had another calling and studying was not always my first thought."

Georganne delighted the Cosgrave audience gathered May 21, 2013, at the Cosmopolitan Club for the 19th annual Jessica Cosgrave Lifetime Achievement Awards. Founder of her Irish Theater & Film Production Company, Georganne is a mentor and advocate for aspiring Irish actors and playwrights. She moves between her native New York, Los Angeles, and Ireland.

Nearly 100 guests applauded Georganne and her five fellow Cosgrave honorees: Dr. Jacqueline Stuchin-Paprin, Martha Coyle, and Marilyn Gelber, all of New York City; Sandy Rowley Colt, Houston, TX, and Jane Crawford, Weston, CT.

Dr. Jackie Stuchin, as she was known at Finch, headed the Education Department from 1972 to 1974; Martha Coyle, who speaks five foreign languages, worked 38 years for two former worldclass airlines, Pan American and Cia Mexicana de Aviacion; Marilyn Gelber, playwright, artist, former actress, and early childhood education teacher, knew Jessica Finch Cosgrave at Finch; Sandy Colt is a licensed dyslexia therapist and veteran volunteer crew member of the

ELISSA, official tall ship of Texas, and Jane Crawford is known among emerging, contemporary artists throughout the world for her continuing support that began with the Avant-Garde movement more than 40 years ago in New York's SoHo district.

Georganne said that her own talent was in representing the talents of others by presenting works in New York at the Irish Arts Center and the Irish Repertory Theater. But she is multi-talented herself having served five years as cultural director for the Borough of Manhattan under Mayor Ed Koch, helped launch the first Newport (RI) Jazz Festival years ago, worked as a radio jazz disc jockey, opened a jazz club in New York, taught ballroom dancing at the Fred Astaire Studios, had her own public relations firm in L.A., helped found Women in Film, which now has 50,000 members world-wide, is known for her collage art and "never made a dollar while producing 25 plays and marrying five husbands," she added with a smile. She is happily married to composer/lyricist Norman Sachs, who is collaborating on a project with her exhusband, Paul Heller, Academy Awardwinning film producer. Her daughter, Jami Morse Heidegger, headed the venerable Kiehl's skincare company before selling it to L'Oreal. Georganne's father, the late Larry Aldrich, was a wellknown fashion designer and advocate of the arts.

Before joining Finch, **Jacqueline Stuchin-Paprin** had earned graduate degrees at Columbia University Teachers

College and a Ph.D. from NYU. She also was among the first Head Start teachers, working at four schools in Harlem. With her move to Finch she "entered a world of higher education at the other extreme of the socio-economic scale," she said.

"Young minority groups were entering the early stage of focus on their developmental skills, in the expectation that they could exceed the academic achievements of their forebears. While at Finch, females were stepping over the threshold to women's liberation issues, when more career choices began to emerge, choices our mothers and grandmothers could never consider. Beyond our borders, studies conducted in underdeveloped countries have shown that where women have been given educational advantages, the national economy has improved."

Jacqueline is Professor Emerita at Bronx Community College where, for 18 years, she taught adults to read, write and speak correctly. Their average age was 26.

Martha Coyle saw a lot of the world while serving 18 years with Pan American World Airways and 20 years with Cia Mexicana de Aviacion. While with Pan Am she often had to call on her knowledge of several languages at once. She can speak French, Spanish, Portuguese, Italian, and Hebrew. To learn the latter, she lived three years in Israel and studied at Tel Aviv University. "Israel was like an oasis in the desert."

"My great love at Finch was art history with so many museums practically on campus, like the Met and the Frick Collection," she said. She also studied merchandising with the late Christine Bloch but instead of moving in that

direction, a career with the airlines materialized and she stayed with it nearly 40 rewarding years.

"My parents had the idea their daughters should get married and settle into comfortable lifestyles but I wanted to be in New York," said Marilyn Gelber, 86, whose two sisters are 93 and 97. "I grew up in Newton, NJ, the county seat of Sussex County, NJ. The county had more cows than people. At Finch I majored in English and studied poetry with Dr. Johan Egilsrud. He was a great influence I write a lot of poetry today. When I got to Finch, the dorm rooms were full, so I lived at what was then called the Studio Club, at 210 E. 77 St. Today it is the Birch Wathen Lenox School (co-founded by Jessica Finch Cosgrave) where we have Finch meetings, so I have come full circle."

Marilyn eventually traveled way beyond New York, living in Paris for 18 months at the Hotel de Crillon for \$6 a night in the late 1940s, and exploring Europe and northern Africa. But her parents were not relegated to Newton either. They had a pied-a-terre at the Plaza Hotel, available to their daughters at any time. Once an artist spotted Marilyn at the Sherry-Netherland Hotel, he wanted to paint her. Her parents agreed as long her mother could chaperone the sittings. "So she traveled 120 miles round-trip from New Jersey to be there with me," Marilyn said.

Before studying acting with director Lee Strasberg, Marilyn taught early childhood education and served as teacher, director, and co-founder of nursery and kindergarten schools on Manhattan's Upper West Side. She always had a secret wish to be an actress and did perform in several Off Broadway shows.

Always a loyal supporter of Finch,

Marilyn brought a tableful of guests to the Cosgrave Awards, which raises funds for Finch Grants that assist women with a 2year college degree who want to go on to earn their B.A. degree.

"I thank Finch for its mission to help women with the brains but not the means to continue their education," said Marilyn.

A Planned Parenthood activist since 1971, **Sandy Rowley Colt** readily volunteered to defend the Houston clinic during the 1992 Republican National Convention.

"Volunteers were trained to join arms and cross legs to form a human chain surrounding the clinic," she told the Cosgrave audience. "My fellow clinic defenders were so surprised that I had taken an activist stance before, as a senior at Finch, when I marched in protest of the invasion of Cambodia in May 1970, in Washington, D.C., at the White House with my Finch College classmates. I went on to be active in Planned Parenthood Gulf Coast as co-chair of a gala and as a board member for seven years."

While Planned Parenthood is still a major concern, Sandy now has a full-time practice as a licensed dyslexia therapist and is recognized in Houston and elsewhere for her ability to help people of any age conquer a reading disability. When her youngest child was having problems in kindergarten, Sandy enrolled him in academic language therapy and took classes herself to become a therapy specialist. That young man recently graduated from Texas A&M University with a degree in petroleum engineering.

On weekends Sandy and her husband, Sloan, are in Galveston, TX, volunteering to scrub, sand, paint, varnish, and check the

sails of the ELISSA, the historic tall ship of Texas, built in 1877 in Aberdeen, Scotland.

"In October we finally get to sail offshore, from Galveston to Corpus Christi. To spend a day on the water working with friends toward a common goal is a good day."

Jane Crawford, a 1970 Finch classmate of Sandy Colt's and a fellow activist, also remembers "several endless bus rides to D.C. to march for civil rights and against the Vietnam War". Jane's fight for the rights of others is a long-time passion that followed her after graduation from Finch to SoHo, where she became an ardent advocate for emerging Avant-Garde artists. She married Gordon Matta-Clark, a leader of the movement who died in 1978. She continues his work for the homeless, building housing structures out of discarded refuse around the globe. With her husband of 33 years, filmmaker Robert Fiore, Jane has assisted on prizewinning documentaries, including the Civil Rights Movement in the South and the 1970 Kent State massacre in Ohio.

"Above all others," she said, "for me it was **Elayne Varian** (director of the Finch College Museum of Art). She quietly created one of the most Avant-Garde museums in the city. And I believe she was the first to show film as art in a museum. For me this was opening a window into a new world, one that has continued to occupy my time and interest. Many of the artists I met at Finch became part of my extended downtown family."

"One day Robert Rauschenberg showed up on campus in a cobalt blue pin-striped suit. Dr. De Marco sent him away saying it was not appropriate, but after learning who he was, chased him down to apologize."

Following the awards, the winner of the \$1,000-money tree was announced: **Dr. Tricia Lin**, director of women's studies at Southern Connecticut State University in

New Haven. One of three judges for the Finch Grant recipients, she serves with **Dr**. **Cecilia Macheski**, now Professor Emerita at LaGuardia Community College, and **Dr**. **Mary Raddock** of Norwalk Community College in Connecticut.

Lois Moran Ziegler was honored at the ceremony for her 16 years of leadership as Chair of the Board of Trustees of the Finch College Alumni Association Foundation Trust.

The efforts of many alumnae went into the success of the 19th annual Cosgrave Awards. Virginia Wattiker Sheerin was honorees chair. Past Cosgrave Honoree Frances Fish Tompkins generously underwrote the cost of the elegant crystal Tiffany bowls individually engraved for each of the honorees. In the Spotlight - Henrietta Santo: Dressing for Success in Social Activism and Philanthropy

Upon graduation from Finch College in 1968 at age 19, Henrietta ("Henny") Santo (née Rothblatt) wrote two nationally syndicated columns, ran a detective agency for criminal defense attorneys, and became a noted polygraph examiner. Later, along with her husband, Berge, she directed the iconic Sign of the Dove restaurant, which twice earned three stars from *The New York Times*.

After seeing her once-vibrant mother lose mobility, Henny became an avid supporter of the importance of understanding both Medicare and longterm health care insurance. Upon moving to Florida, she joined Bankers Life and Casualty Company, becoming a certified Long-Term Care (CLTC) specialist. She is also a contributing long-term health care expert on Public Radio WLRN's *Topical Currents*.

A passionate advocate for those who cannot help or do for themselves, Henny has been involved in many philanthropic and volunteer organizations in both New York and Florida. She was an early participant in City Harvest, providing food for New York's homeless; a Board Member of City-Meals-on-Wheels, which delivers nutritious meals to New York's homebound elderly; and was Project Director for the National Alliance for the Prevention and Treatment of Child Abuse & Maltreatment.

Henny is happily busy these days, overseeing all clothing contributions to the Palm Beach County branch of Dress For Success (DFS), the nationwide nonprofit career development agency with more than 125 affiliates in the U.S. and a dozen other countries. Its clients – females of all ethnic backgrounds, ages, and sizes – run the gamut from those aging out of foster care, to women in their 70s, from those with little or no education to those with PhDs. These women, all of whom are unable to afford appropriate interview clothes, share the same goal: finding a new job.

In order to qualify for the program, clients who, in Palm Beach County, are referred by one of more than 50 outside agencies including The Lord's Place, Goodwill Industries, and AVDA ("Aid for Victims of Domestic Abuse"), must be job-ready. They are provided with clothes as well as makeup application lessons (makeup is often donated by Bobbi Brown). Once they secure a job, they are given a week's worth of clothing, which really adds up to more than that, since each wardrobe consists of coordinated pieces, allowing them to create many different outfits. "Dressers" are assigned to them for help and guidance.

DFS offers two programs: The "Going Places Network," is for women who are actively job hunting. One day a week for three hours, they receive a personality assessment, help with resumes, and practice interviews with actual employers, all of which empower them with the confidence to go out into the working world. So, as they leave the program, they have regained their selfesteem. The second program guides women who are re-entering the workplace, teaching them skills such as how to deal effectively with difficult coworkers and bosses.

Henny loves her work; she started at DFS as a dresser, and for the past two and a half years has been volunteering her services and expertise to the organization, three to four days a week. After a clothing donation is received, it is sent to "the floor" in the agency's high end "boutique". If Henny deems the clothing either unusable or inappropriate, it is donated to other organizations that will make good use of it. And, for the consummate bargain hunter, DFS "sells" high-end clothing (St. John, Escada, Armani, Gucci) for only a minimal donation. This money helps the charity pay its overhead: rent and electric, but no salaries. Last year, the Palm Beach chapter helped approximately 350 women and will serve about 450 of them in 2013. In Memoriam-Lilly Pulitzer: Socialite Turned Fashion Pioneer

The "Queen of Prep", Lillian Pulitzer Rousseau, (born Lillian Lee McKim) better known as Lilly Pulitzer, passed away at her home in Palm Beach, Florida, on April 7, 2013. Born on November 10, 1931, to socialites Robert V. McKim and his wife, Lillian (neé Bostwick), Lillian Lee "Lilly" McKim, the middle daughter of three, attended the Chapin School in New York City, Miss Porter's School in Farmington, Connecticut, and Finch College, her *alma mater*, (though for only one semester). She left Finch to work, first, as a midwife in West Virginia, and then as a volunteer at the veterans hospital in the Bronx.

While on vacation in Palm Beach, she met Peter (Herbert Jr.) Pulitzer, (the dashingly handsome grandson of publisher Joseph Pulitzer), and the young couple eloped in 1952 (shocking her family), and settled in Palm Beach, where Peter owned several citrus groves. With fresh produce from the groves, Lilly opened a juice stand in Palm Beach (on Via Mizner, just off Worth Avenue), but found that squeezing juice ruined her clothes. In order to camouflage the juice stains, Lilly designed a simple sleeveless shift dress made of cotton, in a bright, lively tropical print pattern; thus, fashion history was made: Customers loved it; she produced more in order to sell them at her stand. Eventually, as the dresses sold better than the citrus juice, she focused on designing and selling her "Lillys".

Lilly Pulitzer became president of her own company, Lilly Pulitzer, Inc. in 1959. With the help of partner Laura Robbins, a former fashion editor, she produced the sleeveless, fully lined shifts, and later, collections of other garments " ... around whatever suited [her] fancy ... fruits, vegetables, politics, or peacocks!"¹ It was a "local" company way ahead of its time:

the main factory was located in Miami, Florida and the fabrics were produced by the Key West Hand Print Fabrics Company in Key West. From the 1960s to the early 1980s, elites including members of the Rockefeller, Vanderbilt, and Whitney families, and Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis, wore, adored, and popularized Lilly's colorful fashions. When Jackie, a former classmate of Lilly's, was featured in *Life* magazine wearing a "Lilly" shift, this dress became one of the most successful Lilly Pulitzer styles. Many a Finchite collected or coveted Lillys – and still do.

Lilly and Peter were divorced in 1969. They had three children: Peter, Minnie, and Liza. Although Lilly later married Cuban rancher and lawyer, Enrique Rousseau,² legally changing her name to Lillian McKim Rousseau, her clothing company continued to operate under the label "Lilly Pulitzer". In 1984, Lilly closed down the entire company; but in 1993, Pennsylvania-based Sugartown Worldwide, Inc. contacted her, to bring the brand back due to popular demand and nostalgia. Lilly Pulitzer remained active in the role of creative consultant, involved in new designs, fabrics, collections, and new products (though not the daily activities). In December 2010, Sugartown Worldwide, Inc. was purchased by Atlanta-based Oxford Industries, Inc. for [more than] \$75 million dollars. (Net sales in 2012 were \$122.6 million, according to the company).³ Today, the company maintains 75 Lilly Pulitzer Signature Stores (also known as Via Stores), owns several retail stores, and also sells in upscale department stores.

Known for hosting fabulous parties barefoot at her Palm Beach home, in recent years Lilly Pulitzer published a pair of lifestyle books – *Essentially Lilly: A Guide to Colorful Entertaining* and *Essentially Lilly: A Guide to Colorful Holidays* with her friend, author Jay Mulvaney. Her fashions have been exhibited in museums. She also released two colorful desk calendar books. Everspirited, and a champion of "prep-chic", she created special collections with sorority prints on them, holding contests on her Facebook page to vote on which ones would win their own prints.

"Style isn't just about what you wear, it's about how you live," Pulitzer said in 2004. "We focus on the best, fun and happy things, and people want that. Being happy never goes out of style."⁴

Later, after moving to New York to live with a relative and successfully passing the GED exam, Moreen worked in customer service for several airline companies at JFK Airport, before entering LaGuardia Community College where she made Dean's List first semester and earned membership into Phi Theta Kappa. She also participated in the prestigious Exploring Transfer summer program at Vassar College. Transferring to Mount Holyoke College, Moreen will study international relations, human rights, and public policy. Her objective is to help those without a voice and a limited knowledge of their rights to access the resources and services to which they are entitled.
