MEET THE 2023 COSGRAVE HONOREES

SALLY JOHNSON SHY Sally Johnson Shy grew up in Memphis, Tennessee. After a gap year following high school, she went to Newport College but

found out it was not accredited. Her father called his friend, famed pianist Peter Duchin, who said that Finch College would be perfect for her and immediately contacted Finch president Dr. Roland De Marco. She started at Finch two weeks into the first semester. There, she was president of the student body, a member of the Ineamus Meliora Honor Society, and spent her junior year abroad. She graduated in 1967 with a B.A. degree in art history.

After graduation, "I traveled extensively and finally settled down in 1970, when I married DeWitt Shy and moved from Lookout Mountain to Memphis." She became involved with many charitable organizations and served on the boards of the Junior League, the Marguerite Piazza Gala for St. Jude, the Dixon Gallery and Gardens, and others. She is past president of Memphis in May, a month-long celebration that honors a specific foreign country every year.

In 1988, she started a small business that became Sally Shy Event Design, creating weddings, political events, and special

celebrations for private and corporate clients. During this time, she also wrote a children's book, Daphney at the Peabody, which gave "human qualities" to the famous Peabody Hotel ducks.

During her event design business experience, Sally became aware of the lack of proper etiquette for introductions, wedding announcements, and other social interactions. Knowing most of the rules of etiquette, but never having instructed others, she and a friend attended the Protocol School of Washington and became certified in International Protocol and Corporate Business Dining Etiquette. "I still consult on various events and teach etiquette to children, college students, and corporate interns," she says.

Sally is the mother of Sellers Shy and Genevieve Chapman and the very proud grandmother of 6 grandchildren and 4 stepgrandchildren, who are all involved in competitive sports.

Sally loved her time at Finch and is "grateful for an education that translates across the globe and friendships that I've cherished for a lifetime."

As a young woman, Sherry Foster Taxman commuted from Long Island, NY to attend Finch College from 1967 to 1969, where she was a math and science major and learned the sport of fencing. In 1970, she took classes in art, literature, and sociology at The New School for Social Research in Manhattan. After marrying in 1971, she moved to Omaha, Nebraska, where she completed her bachelor's degree at Creighton University.

"One of my first jobs after college was at Project Success, a unique program for developmentally disabled adults, and I also served as Youth Director at the Jewish Community Center, where I supervised the B'nai B'rith Youth Organization programs for the region," Sherry recounts. After studying interior design, she focused on commercial work. In 1978, after doing extensive research, she moved in another direction and developed a hospice program; she also taught behavioral medicine to medical students and residents.

After a divorce, she chose to remain in Omaha with her infant daughter. "But later, in New York City, I met my current husband, Jeff, an Omaha native. Together, we returned to Omaha, where my second daughter was born," Sherry says.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: CEIL GAVIN AINSWORTH

Cecille ("Ceil") Gavin was named for her mother, Cecille. Hailing from Boston, Ceil's father, Gerald Gavin, owned a housing construction company with his brother. But Ceil never got to know her dad, who died of a heart attack at age 47 when Ceil was only 9 months old. When Ceil was 10 years old, her mother married widower Augustus Rogers, and they moved to New York City. As a high school freshman, Ceil rebelled by going back to Boston to live with an aunt

afores! Before long, Ceil hired a team of seamstresses. To help promote her goods, she hung an organdy pinafore on the fire escape, which drew notice from the Editor of Bride's Magazine. Bridal designer, Priscilla of Boston who had a large factory, took notice and she contacted Ceil. They soon became partners in a business that would last for 20 years. During this time, the 2 women found a floor-through space near Lord & Taylor on 38th Street large enough to accom-

Grades 10-12 were spent Marymount at on 90th & Fifth Manhattan. in Although she was accepted at Pembroke College during her senior year, her stepfather died, and she opted to go to Finch College where she took Home Economics her first year there. Bored by the content and despising the course's lack of structure, she de-



cided to major in Art History with Dr. Tomasini; she loved studying Italian Renaissance Art. Ceil later met Wichita native, Bill Ainsworth, at a Cornell party in New York. After graduating from Finch, she worked as a Receptionist at the Young & Rubicam Advertising Agency and at the white-shoe law firm of Simpson, Thacher and Bartlett. After she and her husband separated, a shopping trip took her to Best & Co. (now, the Olympic Tower!) in search of a pinafore for her infant daughter, Susan. She was stunned to find that the saleswoman didn't even know what a pinafore was! Like the saying, "Necessity is the mother of invention," this mother realized that her female contemporaries would surely know a pinafore when they saw one! During this time, Ceil had a Haitian nanny for her daughter. After describing what pinafores were to this woman, Ceil rented a sewing machine and asked her to make one. The result was a magnificently embroidered pinafore! Being the budding entrepreneur that she was, Ceil submitted a photo of young Susan in a pinafore to the magazine of the Junior League, which they published. Meanwhile, around 1968, Ceil rented a space at 71st & Lexington near her apartment building, where she soon created "Poupées ("dolls") and Pinafores," complete with dressed stuffed bears as showpieces. Next, she contacted New York Times fashion editor, Bernadine Morris, whom she persuaded to visit her workroom. The result was a NYT article called "The Doll's House." Before long, news about Ceil and her enterprise travelled fast and she received a call from a merchandise manager at Marshall Field in Chicago. The store ended up buying 4 dozen pinbach's, Lord & Taylor and numerous specialty stores around the country, with many sales reps in major markets such as Chicago, Dallas and Seattle. By the time Ceil left the business for good 35 years, \$3 million in sales later, and with enough pinafores to dress the entire cast of Gilbert & Sullivan's famous comic opera, she turned to manufacturing dresses to be worn under the pinafores, as well as standalone dresses for toddlers, to sizes 7-14.

In 2001, Ceil saw an ad for Associate Publisher for Our Town, a Manhattan neighborhood newspaper. She got the job and was a top ad salesperson for many years for all 7 of the company's papers, starting out with the Upper East Side as her territory, and ending with the responsibility for all of the Manhattan neighborhoods covered by the paper. She retired in 2020, just before the Covid-19 pandemic hit.

Today, Ceil lives in a comfortable 2-bedroom apartment on the Upper East Side near her childhood home, with her rescued toy poodle mix, Lily. She loves to reminisce about her time at Finch, and is so grateful for the many friendships of different decades from Finch she has made, thanks to volunteering for the Finch College Alumni Foundation, whose rapid growth is due in large part to the tirelessness and creativity she has contributed to its successful scholarship fundraising efforts.

Ellen Easton's article, "It's a White Chocolate World in Winter," appeared in the January 11, 2023 edition of Westchester and Fairfield County Business Journals. Here is her recipe for White Chocolate Truffles:

TOOLS:

Double boiler Parchment or wax paper Wire rack or tray Cling wrap Small scoop, melon baller or measuring spoon Slotted spoon

INGREDIENTS:

8 oz. white chocolate (Lindt, Ghirardelli, etc. You may substitute milk chocolate or dark chocolate.) 2 tbsps. heavy cream (Optional: extracts, grated nuts, sprinkles, cocoa, crushed candy canes.)

Directions:

Place the chocolate in the top part of a double boiler, making certain the bottom of the pan does not touch the water underneath. Slowly melt it over a low flame, stirring occasionally. Add the heavy cream.

When melted, add a few drops of your extract of choice, for additional flavor. Once blended, remove the mixture from the heat. Place bowl covered with cling wrap in the refrigerator for 5 to 10 minutes to allow mixture to become pliable.

Using a small scoop, melon baller or measuring spoon, make chocolate balls in the desired size. Using either butter paddles or your hands, roll the chocolate into shape. If using an outer coating, place the coating in a separate bowl. With a slotted spoon, gently dust all sides of the chocolate.

Pour the chocolate into candy cups on a wire rack or tray. Place the tray in the refrigerator to set the chocolate. Once set, remove and serve, or box them to give as gifts.

Yields 12-24 pieces, depending on size.

All rooms have only one bed.

There she cooked on charter boats and sailed the islands, eventually settling down in the U.S. Virgin Islands, where she lived for more than 20 years. She served on the board of the local League of Women Voters and as president of the St. Thomas-St. John Arts Council.

While visiting her son Devin in New Orleans, where he attended college, she fell in love with the city's architecture and culture. Impulsively, she purchased a home there and has been in residence ever since. "I continue to travel to New York, St. Thomas, Spain, England, and France, and I focus on my hobbies of pottery and art," she says.

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He is survived by a daughter, Elizabeth Kim (Brian) Mannion, 3 grandchildren: Meghan (Seth Chadosh), Alex, and Peter (Yiyi Zhang) Mannion, and 2 great-grandchildren, 3 brothers, 2 sisters and several nieces and nephews.

Marla received her bachelor's degree at Finch before attending Columbia University, where she earned a master's degree in zoology and master of philosophy degree.

Marla spent over 50 years in New York

After completing three years in genetic research at Columbia, she focused her talent and energy as a community and non-profit volunteer for the rest of her life. Marla was one of the first three female

Auxiliary Mounted Police Officers in New York City in 1973, where she patrolled Central Park on horseback for over 15 years, achieving the rank of Lieutenant.

Marla and Buddy Perkel spent their honeymoon in 1961 in Provincetown and fell in love with Cape Cod, where, starting in 1970, they summered with their family in Wellfleet. She and Buddy - her husband of 61 years moved full-time to North Truro in 2001, and then to Provincetown in 2019.

A devoted mother, grandmother, aunt and friend, Marla is survived by her husband, Buddy Perkel, of Provincetown, MA; her daughter, Diana Perkel, of Amesbury, MA; her daughter, Rachel Perkel (Shawn Becker); grandchildren Aaron and Abigail Becker of Burlingame, CA; and niece Marla (Jacques) Brand of Scarsdale, NY
