Finch Scholar Accomplishments

The introduction of the Freya Moskowitz Stern Scholarship provides an additional \$2500 award to the student as she enters her fourth year, assuring she receives a bachelor's degree. Recent awardees are:

Vanessa Cardona will graduate with a BS degree in chemistry from George Washington University, Washington DC. She received the Freya Moskowitz Stern Scholarship and transferred from Raritan Valley Community College in New Jersey. A member of the Alpha Chi Sigma professional chemistry fraternity and Sigma Alpha Lambda national leadership and honors society, she has been accepted into a dual BS/MS program in forensic sciences.

Amanda English, Dr. Katherine Hampares Scholarship recipient, is the very first scholar to take all four years on line at both Herkimer County Community College and Utica College, in New York. She majored in cyber security with a concentration in cyber crime and fraud investigation and graduates with honors. Amanda is a single mother, who has raised her two children and cared for sick family.

Chu May Paing, recipient of the Finch College Foundation Scholarship, graduates with honors from Queens College after transferring from LaGuardia Community College. She has majored in linguistics and plans to teach English to speakers of other languages at the college level. European Fine Art Foundation Inaugural New York Fair

Finch alumnae and FCAAFT Co-chairperson, Ceil Gavin Ainsworth, arranged for the Finch group to visit the venerable Park Avenue Armory on October 23, 2016, for a docent-led VIP tour of the TEFAF (The European Fine Art Foundation) Inaugural New York Fair. Formerly organized by Haughton International Fairs, this outstanding event showcased art from antiquity to the early 20th century, all rigorously vetted. Established in 1988, and based in Maastricht, The Netherlands, TEFAF is noted for works of excellent quality and connoisseurship, considered by many to be the foremost event of its kind for art, antiquities, furniture, and design.

The show, which flowed through the huge 55,000-square-foot Wade Thompson Drill Hall and the well-appointed chambers and halls on the first and second floors, featured collections from 94 dealers from 13 countries. Among the show's many masterpieces, nine rarities formerly in private collections were featured, including a newly discovered van Gogh painting (at the Dutch gallery Kunstgalerij Albricht), a pair of rare 19th century gilded dolphin tables made by Marsh and Tatham and formerly in the

collection of the Duke of Sutherland (at Ronald Phillips Ltd), and a marble Venus-de-Milo-like Aphrodite from the 1st century BC (at Phoenix Ancient Art, its booth set up to look like the interior of the Pantheon).

A second installment of the exciting TEFAF show at the Armory is scheduled for May 3-9, 2017—a worthwhile extension of a Finch trip to NYC in time for the May 16 Cosgrave Awards!

Rubin Museum of Art

FCAAFT Co-chairperson, Liz Glick Colin, organized a trip to the Rubin Museum of Art on November 4, 2016. The Rubin is an arts and cultural hub in New York's Chelsea neighborhood that inspires visitors to make powerful connections between contemporary life and the art, cultures, and ideas of the Himalayas and neighboring regions, including India.

The evening began with a gathering in the lounge, where the group enjoyed regional music, wine, and tapas. Then, the Finch alumnae and friends had a docent-led tour of the museum's Himalayan and Tibetan art exhibits, which included artwork in every medium that conveyed the spiritual and philosophical forces that have influenced the region's inhabitants

The Salon Art + Design

A docent-led tour of *The Salon* Art + Design. also arranged by Ceil and held at the Park Avenue Armory on November 12, 2016, has become a perennial favorite of Finch alumnae and friends. The acclaimed Sanford Smith show featured outstanding artwork, furniture, jewelry and objets d'art ranging from classical and ancient art to contemporary art and design, the main focus of the show. Fifty-five galleries from all over the world, presenting new and exciting work each year, are represented. According to the Salon's executive director, Jill Broker: "Each year [The Salon] expands its exploration into cultures of the distant and more recent past... and presents the art and objects that have already become or are on their way to becoming timeless."

After touring the vast show filled with works of great innovation, imagination, and beauty, the Finch group convened in the Collector's Lounge (the historic Colonel's Room). Complimentary champagne was provided, courtesy of Ruinart Champagne, one of the Salon's several highly esteemed sponsors.

Tour of Caramoor and Holiday Tea/Musicale

On December 9, 2016, FCAAFT Treasurer Marjorie Schulman arranged for a very special tour and holiday tea/musicale at the Caramoor Estate in Katonah, New York. It was a wonderful time to visit the beautiful estate, because the main Rosen house was decked out in holiday splendor—from the gracious entrance hall to the many corridors and exquisitely furnished rooms. The welcoming and knowledgeable docents shared stories of the family that once lived there and their astounding art collection.

Caramoor, which conjures up Tales of the Arabian Nights, was the country estate and home of lawyer and banker Walter Rosen, his wife Lucie. and their two children. Walter, Jr and Anne, The Rosens, who had fallen in love with the Italianate cedar garden, purchased the property from Walter's friend and former law partner Charles Hoyt in 1928. The estate was, in fact, named for Charles' late mother, Caroline Moore Hoyt. The house that exists today is not the original; in derelict condition, that structure was razed soon after the purchase. However, the Great Depression forced the Rosens to alter and scale back their plan to erect a grand American palazzo in place of the original house. Converted from the already completed farm complex, with a central courtvard, the handsome Mediterranean-style villa was the result. By the time of its completion in 1939, entire rooms of 17th-, 18th-, and 19th-century European architectural elements, Renaissance art and furniture, tapestries, Chinoiserie, and an extensive Asian art collection, many pieces from their travels and/or NYC apartment, were moved into or adjusted to fit the villa. A new wing with three period rooms and objets d'art from the Rosens' townhouse was added in the 1970s by daughter Anne Rosen Stern.

Each room is a delight to behold, with treasures that rival those in the Metropolitan Museum of Art (some of which are still in its collections today). Tiepolo doors! The glorious vaulted ceil-

ing of the Burgundian library! The dining room, with its adjoining breakfast room, its smaller scale version, is clothed in 18th-century Chinese wallpaper, purchased from an antique dealer in Venice. The red lacquer caned-seat chairs are replicas of the original 24 early 17th-century English side and armchairs, purchased from the Spanish Duke of the Infantado estate around 1935, part of the Duke's collection of 72. Some are now housed in the Metropolitan and Victoria and Albert Museums. (The two remaining original armchairs from the Rosens' purchase are on display in a separate, small, temperature-controlled room, alongside other treasures, which include a Chin Dynasty carved jade and teak screen.) After scaling back the dining room's size (still grand enough to accommodate a magnificent lacquer table and chairs, an English papier mache mantelpiece from 1760, the stunning Caldwell & Company chandelier designed for the room, its birdcage shape echoing the walls' delicate Chinoiserie motifs), two rolls of the rare wallcovering remained. Walter traded these for an Emperor's chair, now in the "Spanish alcove."

Both Walter and Lucie were devoted and accomplished musicians (he played the piano, and she, the theremin, an early electronic musical instrument controlled without contact by the performer). In addition to their passion for beautiful artwork and architecture, they brought music to their country home by creating a music room, which would

become the heart and soul of Caramoor. From 1939 on, they sought to share this joy—hosting parties, concerts, informal house tours, and storied masked gala balls for friends and visitors from the community and beyond. Boxes of correspondence now archived at the Rosen house include letters and invitations from music and art history's most lauded personalities including Leopold Stokowski and John Cage. But after the tragic death of their son, an Air Force pilot killed over Germany in 1944, the Rosens bequeathed their home to the public in his memory as a center for music and art. The inaugural public concert, performed by the Koutzen String Quartet, was hosted by the Rosens at the home in June 1946.

Today, nearly 25,000 people visit the Rosen House annually, including some 6,000 school-age children, who learn about art and music through Caramoor's Arts-in-Education program. During the summer, concerts are held in the Spanish courtyard. Tours and afternoon teas are offered throughout the year, continuing the tradition of presenting music in the magnificent music room.

The Finch group gathered in that very room, resplendent in holiday decoration, to enjoy (and sometimes join in) the wonderful holiday musicale, sung by soprano Kayla Berghoff and baritone Michael Axtell, and accompanied by pianist Brent Funderburk. The afternoon tea included delightful tea sandwiches, pastries, and an assortment of excellent teas, all served on exquisite antique chinaware. Through stained glass windows, the setting sun basked the elegant music room in golden light. It was a perfect way to celebrate the holiday season!

Bohemian National Hall/New York Ceramics & Glass Fair

A trip to the Bohemian National Hall/New York Ceramics & Glass Fair on January 19, 2017, was arranged for Finch by FCAAFT Co-chairperson Liz Glick Colin. The Bohemian National Hall, at 320 East 73rd Street, was built as a social hall for the Czech and Slovak community in the late 1890s. A New York City landmark, the building itself is a grand five-story, seventy-foot wide palazzo, designed in Neo-Renaissance style by architect William C. Frohne. Adjacent to the Czech Consulate General, it is an important

of Ellis Island facilities. It was quite impressive! A painless history lesson in a gorgeous setting on a pluperfect fall day.

multi-functional center for that community and the general public. Offering language classes, films, lectures, and art exhibitions, it houses a library and a room dedicated to renowned 19th-century composer, Antonin Dvorak.

The visit began with a lecture—one of a series related to the New York Ceramics & Glass Fair exhibition--entitled "Inside the Head of a Collector." The speaker, Dr. Shirley M. Mueller, a former medical doctor, is now an art collector. She explained the science of behavioral economics: how well-studied thought process-

es affect our purchasing decisions. Specific psychological motivators—pride, creating a sense of history, the thrill of the chase—are involved in such a purchase. Dr. Mueller also explained how buying decisions may be influenced by "anchoring" (the lure of a bargain), "sunk cost" (time and money already invested), and faulty memory, and illustrated woeful tales of impressive art and objets d'art for which she-as well as museums-had overpaid, rashly acquired, and/or under-insured. She showed diagrams of the brain's excited neurological (often reptilian, rather than limbric/emotional and neocortal/analytical) responses to the trigger of an anticipated purchase. Dr. Mueller added one final cautionary note that, according to some experts, "50% of art in circulation is either misappropriated or fake!"

With all that in mind, the Finch group continued on to the glorious and vast ceramics and

glass fair, where there were many examples of Bohemian glass. But the vast array of this stunning-and, especially in the case of contemporary, often witty—work was from the United States as well as other countries. It was inspiring to see the new exciting sculptural art displayed alongside some lovely traditional pieces. Most of the artists and galleries have shown work at the Armory Salon and other venues. The contemporary work ranged from the political to the purely aesthetic.

Among the favorites were "A Piece of Pennsylvania," a bead-

work sculpture by Leslie B. Grigsby; Justin Rothshank's political plates; Vetro Vero hand-blown designs by Michael Schunke and Josie Gluck; and iridescent pottery by Hideaki Miyamura.

All of these visits and tours, arranged by FCAAFT volunteers for Finch alumnae, friends, and family, continue to bring the Finch community together and help fulfill our mission to raise scholarship funds. The fall and winter events raised a significant amount of scholarship funds. Plans for other exciting and informative events are under way.

NINA DIGIOVANNA LABRUNA:

A COOKING NONNA

Nina DiGiovanna LaBruna (Finch Class of 1960) sent the following story about her recent Italian cooking adventures and their Finch connection:

"On a beautiful day in August 2009, I had invited some of my fellow Finch alumni for lunch at my summer home in Elberon on the Jersey shore. We were about 25 people in all. My husband Vinny co-hosted, and some of the ladies brought their husbands.

Drinks and hors d'oeuvres were served on the porch followed by a buffet lunch in the dining room. I enjoy cooking and prepared many different dishes from the past, most of them Italian. Everyone seemed to like it. After lunch, Magda Stark Katz (a fellow Finchie) caught me in the kitchen and said to me, 'I know you are the grandmother of five children, and didn't your mother's family originate in Tuscany?' 'Yes,' I answered. I knew that Magda was very active and successful in the entertainment industry. She proceeded to tell me that she had received an email from Vito Rago, who was producing an Internet TV show called 'Cooking with Nonna.' The premise of the show was to invite nonnas (grandmothers) from different regions in Italy to teach his beautiful twenty-something daughter Rossella how to prepare the cuisine of that particular area. Vito wanted Magda to find a nonna from Tuscany. And there I was.

Magda wanted me to come back to New York City so she could interview me on tape and send it on to Vito. I was reluctant to leave my husband alone at the beach house, so she interviewed me right there in my kitchen. Days later, Magda called me and told me that Vito liked my presentation and wanted me on the show. I consulted with my husband and we thought it might be fun. I agreed to do a show. In October, Vinny drove me to Montville, New Jersey, where the show was filmed. It was all very professional with a camera crew, special kitchen set-up, and a woman who did my make-up.

The recipe I chose to do was Petto de Limone (chicken with lemon and wine). The show went well. I was very relaxed and thought it was fine. Weeks later, Vito called and asked me to do a second show. This time I chose Zuppa di Verza (a Tuscan soup with kale, cabbage, and sausage). I didn't do any shows after that. I felt that I was, shall we say, "a bit too mature" to start a second career, and I knew there were many more nonnas waiting to be heard.

The Cooking with Nonna show has been viewed by thousands of people during the past eight years and continues to be very popular. In October 2016, Vito called me and asked me if he could include my chicken with lemon recipe in a cookbook about the show that was going to be published. I agreed. After a few weeks, he called again and asked if he and Rossella could come to my New York apartment, interview me, and take some photos for the book, as well as prepare a meal together. They came and we had a delightful afternoon. The cookbook will be available at Barnes and Noble on March 15, 2017 and can also be purchased through Amazon. I have been invited

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: ELIZABETH GLICK COLIN

Born and raised in the Midwood section of Flatbush, Brooklyn, Elizabeth (Liz) Glick attended PS 99 (grades K through 8) and Midwood High, before spending her first 2 years as an undergrad at The American University in Washington, DC. For her junior year, she studied in Paris at the Cours de Civilisation Française de la Sorbonne and remained abroad at the University of Grenada in Malaga, Spain, for summer study. Back to New York in 1972, she graduated from Finch College at the end of 1973.

Liz attributes her many future opportunities to come-starting with her first job out of collegeto the "Finch Connection." When one speaks of "Afghan" something-or-other, a certain breed of dog or cozy covering might easily come to mind. Not so for Liz, whose first place of employment was the Afghan Mission to the United Nations in New York. The fact that she majored in French was certainly instrumental in getting the job, which required translating from French to English; but, she insists, "It was the stellar reputation and cachet of the Finch woman that cinched the deal! Working with the delegates provided a special cultural and work experience. I loved that there was actually a UN committee on 'The Peaceful Uses of Outer Space,' in which they played an active role!"

Liz met her future husband, Allan, on a train to Westchester. The very mention of Finch was the only "introduction" necessary to spark his interest and establish his ever-lasting devotion! She would soon become involved - and in love - with the family music publishing company, created in the late 1930s by her father-in law, renowned trumpeter Charles Colin. Many of the brass and jazz methods – both then and now - remain staples for musicians worldwide. Located in a small, quirky building on West 53rd Street, they also rented out music practice rooms used largely by Broadway and studio players to warm up or teach, so the joint was always jumpin'! As luck would have it, "Colin Music" was (anonymously) submitted for listing in the international "Guide to Routard" tourist booklet, as the place to go if seeking hard-to-find music. As a result, when in New York, musicians from around the world always bee-lined it to their place where they often had the delight of bumping into music celebrities and long-lost friends, while, at the same time, actually finding hard-to-come-by music. In addition to the publishing business, Liz and family ran the New York Brass Conference for Scholarships, a nonprofit music organization that produced an annual 3-day brass music festival in Manhattan.

Fast forward to 2005: Liz was diagnosed with stage 2 breast cancer, which involved a lumpectomy, followed by several months of chemotherapy and radiation. However fabulous and supportive Allan was, as husband and Christian Scientist, her dear Finch pals—Obron Farber, Claudie Frohwirth Gvertz, and Laura Morris—were always there for her, every step of the way. Happily, she is cancerfree today.

Soon after, a new and wonderful chapter unfolded in her life, thanks to Ceil Gavin Ainsworth, who had formed a group of Francophiles with Robert Diffenderfer, Finch's beloved French professor. Along with Cheryl Deknatel and the late Barbara Glickman, Ceil hosted wonderful weekly French conversation and literature meetings, led by "Deef," in her home.

Liz says: "A few years ago, the family sold the building on 53rd Street and we moved the operation to our home in Tappan, New York. Depending more on our dealers now, plus liberated from the daily commute to mid-town, I started to indulge

in numerous sessions and training at the local gym. However, when Ceil appealed for further hands-on involvement with the Finch Association, I was inspired to put some of that new 'muscle' to work for the organization, run by a wonderfully dedicated and professional team of Finch women."

Besides Allan, the other terrific men in Liz's life are sons Zachary and Asher, who live in California, and her older brother, Kenneth, who is in Philadelphia. She is currently co-chair of the Finch College Alumni Association Foundation Trust, a post that keeps her happily engaged and creatively involved in all things Finch.
